J. Brooks Yates Jr., CPL

Brooks Yates, CPL, is senior vice president of A&D/land at Peregrine Petroleum Partners Ltd., an oil and gas exploration and production company with offices in Dallas and Houston and operations in Texas, North Dakota, Oklahoma and Louisiana. Prior to joining Peregrine, he spent over 15 years as vice president of land at Ventex Oil & Gas Inc. During the 1990s, he was land manager for The Rudman Partnership. A native of Mississippi and an alumnus of The University of Mississippi, Yates began his career in the oil and gas business as a landman in various land roles with Hunt Energy Corp. and Placid Oil Co. in the 1980s before being moved to Shreveport and ultimately Dallas.

A member of AAPL since 1985, Yates served on the Executive Committee as treasurer during 2010-11, spent three terms as a director and chaired multiple committees, including the NAPE Advisory Board, NAPE Operators Committee, Southwest Land Institute, Publications Committee and Marketing Committee. He also previously served on the AAPL Investment Advisory Board, Legislative and Regulatory Committee and Ethics Committee. He currently serves on the NAPE Operators Committee. He earned his CPL designation in 1991.

Yates is a longtime member of the Houston Association of Professional Landmen, the Ark-La-Tex Association of Professional Landmen and the Dallas Association of Petroleum Landmen, where he served as president in 1992 and 2008 and was named Landman of the Year in 2009 and 2021. The Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association included him among the Texas Top Producers in 2013.

In addition, Yates is president of the Dallas Producers Club and a member of the Dallas Wildcatters board. He also is a Founding Advisory Committee member of the University of Texas Energy Management Program and a founding member of the Texas Alliance of Landman Associations.

Yates lives in Dallas with his wife, Linda. Married for 34 years, they are active members of Highland Park Presbyterian Church, where he has served as deacon and on various committees. They have three adult children and two grandchildren.

She is a member of the Women's Energy Network, the Fort Worth Wildcatters, and the Dallas Holocaust and Human Rights Museum. In her spare time, McCaskell and her spouse, the Rev. Rodney Black, CPL, is a second-generation landman who found his calling once he began landwork. Raised in Magnolia, Arkansas, he earned a bachelor's degree in biological sciences from Southern Arkansas University in 2000 and soon after began working as a field landman in East Texas for JIMAR Resources.

In 2002, he began his career as an in-house landman with XTO Energy Inc. in 2002 and was quickly put to the test chasing rigs in East Texas at a time when XTO was experiencing rapid growth in the basin. After a fast-paced decade, Black moved on to work the Permian Basin as a division landman at the onset of the Wolfcamp revolution. A few years later, he was promoted to regional land manager in the Appalachia Basin managing a significant joint venture in Ohio and

ultimately assumed land responsibilities for West Virginia as well. Following the completion of the joint venture, he found himself back in the Permian Basin managing a freshly acquired 230,000-acre Delaware Basin position.

In January 2018 Black began a new chapter in his career as the senior vice president of land with CH4 Energy Six LLC, a private-equity company backed by NGP Energy Capital. Through its subsidiary Uinta Wax LLC, the company currently owns 230,000 net acres in the Uinta Basin in eastern Utah. He is still as enthusiastic about land and working the deal as ever.

Encouraged by his father, Black has been an active member of AAPL since his first days in the business. Leading by example, Doug Black, who worked as a landman for 40 years, served on numerous AAPL committees throughout his career, including the Executive Committee in 2004-05. Following in his dad's footsteps, Black served on many AAPL committees and also chaired the Education Committee in 2013-14, Ethics Committee in 2017-18, Membership Committee in 2020-21.
