



### **AAPL CONSOLIDATED REVENUE AND EXPENSES** 2015-22






STATISTICS FROM LANDMAN LEARNING — AAPL'S NEW LEARNING MANAGEMENT SYSTEM



### **CERTIFICATION BY TYPE**





## **GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS REPORT**



## ADVOCACY (LEGISLATIVE, REGULATORY AND JUDICIAL):

- ► AAPL-sponsored Texas legislation, SB 604, signed into law by Gov. Abbott. The bill expands protections for landmen working in Texas to include the AAPL adopted definitions and updates current law to include work in renewables, geothermal, hydrogen and even yet unknown energy sources. These protections extend to unauthorized practice of law exemptions, independent contractor recognition and franchise tax carveouts.
- ► Delivered multiple AAPL president's letters to President Biden, the U.S. House of Representatives and U.S. Senate leadership, the U.S. Department of the Interior, the U.S. Department of Energy and the U.S. Department of Environmental Protection on issues ranging from federal on- and offshore leasing, the Strategic Petroleum Reserve drawdown, methane emissions policies and strongly expressing our support for traditional domestic energy production, as well as renewables and an all-the-above domestic energy strategy.
- Joined national and regional partner energy groups, such as the Independent Petroleum Association of America, American Exploration & Production Council, the Texas Independent Producers & Royalty Owners Association, Texas Oil & Gas Association and Western Energy Alliance, among others, to promote and support advocacy campaigns and stakeholder outreach to protect a landman's right to work and support the energy industry.
- Supported the successful effort in conjunction with the California Independent Petroleum Association and Western States Petroleum Association to stop passage of California SB 556, a bill that would have allowed Californians who developed serious illnesses to hold oil drillers liable if they lived, worked or attended school within 3.200 feet of oil drilling and if the company did not use the "best technologies" to mitigate risk. The bill would have also shifted the burden to oil and gas companies, rather than plaintiffs, to prove their case in court.

- ► Continued coordinated advocacy efforts with the Professional Certification Coalition to advance legislation in the U.S. Senate that will provide AAPL members with reimbursements for costs associated with professional certification and stopping any state legislation seeking to require landman licensing.
  - Provided members with critical federal and state regulatory updates and opportunities to comment on proposed rulemaking from the EPA, Interior Department, U.S. Securities & Exchange Commission, California Air Resources Board, Colorado Oil and Gas Conservation Commission, New Mexico Environment Department and Texas Railroad Commission.
  - Assisted members with inquiries for regulatory and legal intervention, including reviewing requests for AAPL amicus briefs in cases involving leasing, royalty allocation disputes and employee misclassification claims.
- Tracked, analyzed, and reported on a record number of bills for members, provided biweekly governmental affairs bill tracking snap bill summaries and published biweekly governmental affairs reports for members on monitored legislative, regulatory and judicial matters – totaling hundreds of pages of content available exclusively for members.
